I received from the tournament director 41 compositions in anonymous format. However, the presentation was not uniform: some entries had only the positions, others with positions and solutions and finally some had positions, solutions and comments.

I suggested this theme having in mind the anticipation risk is reduced. Although I was aware the required theme was difficult, I didn't expect to see so many not thematic entries. From the beginning I had to exclude the following 15 entries which didn't show any Leibovici interference: 1, 2, 3, 22 (also illegal position), 23, 24 (also illegal position), 25, 28, 29, 30, 31, 32, 33, 34, 35. That's an enormous percentage of 38% not thematic entries, which should have not been accepted by the tournament director, taking into consideration the theme definition was clearly stated in the announcement: "In the mating position a black line is interfered by a black piece moving along the pin-line". Other 6 entries had serious defects, such as being single phase compositions: 5, 39 or having repeated moves: 6 (W3), 10 (B2), 12 (W3), 13 (B3+W3).


From the remaining 18 entries, I discarded the following 10 for various flaws:

- 4. Neat dual avoidance, but heavy position and crude captures in W3.
- 11. Rather monotonous play, with lack of white strategy.
- 14. Fictitious strategy: the solution in b) would be the same without bQc8.
- 15. Nice idea, slightly marred by the lack of white strategy.
- 16. Fictitious strategy: same solutions with bPa3 instead of bBa3.
- 18. Fictitious strategy: the first solution works with bPf4 instead of bRf4.
- 26. Lack of white strategy and interplay.
- 27. Spoiled by the complete symmetry of the solutions.
- 36. Fictitious strategy: bQe3 can be replaced by bBe3 with [almost] the same solutions.
- 37. Fictitious strategy: same solutions with bPb3 instead of bRb3.

I suggest the following ranking for the remaining 8 compositions. :


1st Prize – no 41 Jakub Marciniszyn

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2nd Prize – no 7 Anatoly VASYLENKO(UKRAINE)

is the best entry from the whole competition and overshadows no 7 which now is downgraded to a second prize. The black King goes into the pin-line after wS Kniest sacrifices. The thematic Pelle moves occurring on B3 are also switchbacks. Purists might deplore the capture of the bSg5 in the second solution. An outstanding composition fully deserving the first prize!


The only entry from the competition in which the bK actively moves on the pin-line during the solution. This approach allows a richer strategy in White play, skillfully exploited by the author. The overall harmony is enhanced by the play on the same square by both B1 and W1. The only shadow, yet a significant one, is the unavoidable capture of the bB in the second twin.



In the first solution, on B3 the thematic bQ interferes bRb4 on B3. In the second solution, on B2 there is no interference after the bQ move, but after B3 hideaway the thematic interference appears. This is perhaps the most original interpretation of the thematic requirement from the whole tournament.


Compared to the previous composition, this shows a better analogy. Like in the previous compositions, the wR and wB exchange their functions. A nice touch is the exchange of functions between wPe2 and wPf2 – one is captured and the other opens wRg2 line. This would have been ranked higher without the technical capture of bPb2.

The black critical moves on a5 are performed before the thematic Leibovici interferences. The solutions end in beautiful model mates. A certain lack of interplay prevents a higher classification.





Both White and Black anticipatorily open the line for the white mating piece. The W2 ambush shows a neat FML effect. Only the heterogeneous motivations of B1 slightly detract.

B1 is a selfblock on the same square and opens a line. In both solutions the bQ interferes the bB, while the wS delivers the mate. The ambitious piece of work pays the price of a heavy position.
