I've received 72 compositions from the director Jamal Elbaza in anonymous form. I've removed the following:

A20 - predecessor, YACPDB 46045

A27 - predecessor YACPDB 306517

A28 - predecessor PDB P0539748

A61 – the composition is hurt by too many sollutions, without non-analogical sollutions and without move repeat Rc7-c5 woud be among the awarded.

2nd Prize - predecessors PDB P=1005294, YACPDB 379531 3rd Prize - predecessor YACPDB 392803 Commendation A60 - predecessor, V. Nefyodov, L. Salai jr., E. Klemanič – 2nd Prize Московский конкурс – 2020

The listed compositions have been eliminated from the tournament and the other compositions are moved up in such a way, that 2nd Prize goes to A66 (originally 4th Prize), 3rd Prize A26 (originally 5th Prize).

6th Prize - the white knight does not appear in one of the solutions. The composition thanks to its rich content is not eliminated from the tournament, but receives 1st - 4th H.M. Other H.M. remain without change.

The overal quality of the tournament I consider very good. It appears that compositions of the HOTF type are a real trend and are becoming a necessary accessory of every ambitious composer. The tournament however also showed that HOTF alone is not enough for an award, but an analogy of twin sollutions is also needed.


It is obvious that when it comes to judging chess problems there exists very few objective criteria. They are therefore supplemented to a large extent by the subjective view of the judge, his aesthetic feel and opinion concerning the philosophy of chess composition. This ought to serve to explain, for those who have a different opinion on the order of the compositions as the judge.

I've given the compositions the following awards:

A35 1st Prize Eugene Fomichev (Russia)

HOTF with a clear analogical motivation, with two pairs of balanced sollutions and a rich strategy concerning especially opening lines and unblocking squares for the white queen. The themes Zilahi and Umnov are a natural part of the mechanism. A well-made construction.



HOTF with a double inclusion of the Zilahi theme. The diagonal symmetry is visible, but it doesn't hurt the composition. A tiny flaw in the analogy can be found in B1 in both sollutions.



A compact and harmonic content including unpinning black pieces and capturing them in the another phase. One can't also fault the added Zilahi theme in its passive form - I do not consider the repeating of mating moves to be a flaw in the context of the content. The composition's evaluation is worsened by the creation of twin positions, without those the composition would be placed a few ranks higher.





HOTF with three pairs of sollutions. Unfortunately they are not equal. The most valuable is the first pair with the capturing of white pieces (Zilahi), in the second pair we find a simplier analogy with blocking. But in the third pair the analogical element is only the first queen move, the composition would benefit from the removal of this part of the sollution.

In every case it deserves an award, even if its value is directly proportional to the used means.
