





№44. Marcin Banaszek (Germany) 1st Prize.

1.Rb8?#; 1.Rg3? hxg3 2.Rc8 Kxc8?#, 2...g2+!; White must first guard the d-file and then maneuver its Knight to e6-square in order to guard c7-square. Only then can White sacrifice its Rook on g3-square and play 12.Rb8+ Kxb8. This is accomplished with a witty pendulum movement by the white Rook which represents a staircase Rundlauf by the same Rook. **Sol:1. Re3! Ka7+ 2.Re4+ Kb7 3.Rd4 Ka7+ 4.Rd5+ Kb7 5.Sc5+ Ka7,Kc7 6.Se6+ Kb7 7.Rd4 Ka7+ 8.Re4+ Kb7 9.Re3 Ka7+ 10.Rf3+ Kb7 11.Rg3 hxg3 12.Rb8+ Kxb8#.**


№8. Gennady Kozyura (Ukraine) 2nd Prize.

Sol:1.Sc3! (2.Bc4+ Be6 3.Rxe6+ Rxe6 4.Qxe3+ Bxe3#), 1...Rxe6 2.Kc4+ Kd6 3.Rd5+ Kc6 4.Rd3+ Re4#, 1...Bxe6 2.Kc6+ Kd4 3.Se2+! Kc4 4.Qd5+ Bxd5#. A good strategic selfmate showing Latvian Novotny. The white King is mated in the center of the board on three different squares, while the black King takes a position opposite the white King.


There were several Valladao tasks in this tourney. I like this one is the best. **Sol:1.c8Q+!** Kb5 2.Qg5+ Bf5 3.a4+ bxa3 e.p. 4.e8R a2! (4...h4? leads to selfmate in 7) 5.Re3! (5.0-0-0? a1S!) h4 6.0-0-0 hxg3 7.Rg2 a1S 8.Rb3+ Sxb3#; 7...a1B 9.Rb2 Bxb2#; 6...h3 7.Rh2 a1S 8.Rb3+ Sxb3#; 7...a1B 9. Rb2 Bxb2#. Here, the Valladao task is combined with bicolor AUW. There are some tries as well.






Main plan: 1.Rf7+? Bb7 2.Sh4 e3 3.Sg2 h4 4.Kh1 h3 5.Sg1 e2!; **Sol:1.Bb8+!** Kb7 2.Sh4 e3 3.Bf4 Ka7 4.Bxe3+ Kb7 5.Bf4 Ka7 6.Bb8+ Kb7 7.Bh2 Ka7, and Main plan: 8.Rf7+ Bb7 9.Sg2 h4 10.Kh1 h3 11.Sg1 hxg2#. White must first remove bPe3 before executing the Main plan. Good logical problem.



The mating picture is clear, but to bring the two white self-blocking pieces to b4- and b5-square takes precision.


